PROFILE

Born in Surabaya, Indonesia, Professor Wang Gungwu studied at a high school in Ipoh, Malaysia. He went up to the National Central University of Nanjing, China and then to the University of Malaya. After graduating from the University of Malaya, he received a Doctorate (Ph.D.) from the University of London. While he served as Lecturer and Professor of History, and then Dean of Arts at his alma mater, the University of Malaya, Professor Wang contributed to the establishment of the foundation of historical studies in Malaysia, and edited academic journals of the Nanyang Hsueh-hui and the Malayan Branch Royal Asiatic Society. In 1968 he became Professor of Far Eastern History and was assigned to Director of the Research School of Pacific Studies at Australian National University. He was also appointed President of the Australian Academy of the Humanities and greatly contributed to understanding of Asia in Australia. Since 1986, Professor Wang has continued to be internationally active as Vice-Chancellor of the University of Hong Kong.

Professor Wang is well known for his remarkable originality and analysis in his research on the history of China and the Chinese in Southeast Asia. In recent years, he has been highly esteemed for his theory on pluralistic identities of the Chinese overseas. He is often invited by overseas academic organizations as a visiting professor or research fellow. He has moved the basis for his activities several times between Malaysia, Australia and Hong Kong, and exhibited his eminent leadership at every assignment. In Kuala Lumpur, he was elected President of the International Association of Historians of Asia at the young age of thirty and later resumed the presidency at the same association in Hong Kong. Throughout his career, Professor Wang has significantly contributed to international academic exchanges in Asian studies and played the pivotal role in organizing various international conferences, linking the East and the West, China and the world, the Chinese in Southeast Asia and other Southeast Asians. His comments are listened to with great interest by scholars of Asian studies and learned people from all over the world and that fact makes him an outstanding spokesperson and intellectual leader of Asia. Professor Wang Gungwu's international achievements of such a high caliber are the exemplar for Asia's intelligentsia.
