Composer Born March 16,1930 (age 79) Japan

BRIEF BIOGRAPHY

1930	Born in Tokushima, Japan
1953	Second prize in NHK competition for orchestra music composition with <i>Trinita Sinfonica</i> , premiered by NHK Symphony Orchestra
1955	B.A. (Music), Tokyo National University of Fine Arts and Music
1964	Founded Pro Musica Nipponia and worked as the Artistic Director and Composer for 20 years
1969	Involved in the invention of a 20-string koto (later developed into a 21- string) as well as fostering a number of skilled koto players
1970	Grand Prize in National Arts Festival for Music of Minoru Miki (4 LP record set)
1973-2003	Adjunct Lecturer, Tokyo College of Music (2004-07, Visiting Professor)
1975	Giraud Opera Prize with his first opera, <i>Shunkin-sho</i> , commissioned and premiered by Japan Opera Foundation
1976	Composed the film score for L'Empire des sens directed by Oshima Nagisa
1978	Produced a two-month world tour of Pro Musica Nipponia and performed with great success in various places including Carnegie Hall
1979	His second opera, <i>An Actor's Revenge</i> , commissioned by English Music Theatre Company, was world-premiered in London
1981	Composed <i>Symphony for Two Worlds</i> (final part of his <i>Eurasian Trilogy</i>) for Leipzig Gewandhaus Orchestra bicentennial celebration
1983	Composed <i>Rainbow Overture</i> for Pro Musica Nipponia Beijing & Shanghai tour, the first-ever joint performance by Japan-China traditional orchestra
1985	His third opera <i>Joruri</i> , which was commissioned and premiered by the Opera Theatre of Saint Louis, won much acclaim
1986-	Founder and Artistic Director, Opera Theatre Uta-za (now Miki Opera Company)
1990-	Founder and Artistic Director, Multicultural Ensemble YUI, and has since then performed both at home and abroad
1993	Organized the Orchestra Asia, consisting of Japanese, Chinese, and Korean musical instruments (-2002, Artistic Director)
1994	National Medal of Honor with Purple Ribbon
1998-	Founder and Artistic Director, Aura-J, an Orchestra consisting of Japanese traditional instruments
2000	Order of the Rising Sun
	The Tale of Genji was commissioned and world-premiered by Opera Theatre of Saint Louis
2002	Organized the Asia Ensemble, consisting of leading soloists of Asian traditional instruments (currently, Artistic Director)
2006	With the commissioning and world premiere of his 8th opera, Ai-en, by New National Theatre, Tokyo, the Operatic Cycle on Japanese History completed its journey from the 5th century to the 19th century
2006-	Founder and Artistic Director, Hokuto International Music Festival which is designed for Eastern and Western musical exchange
