



Background of the Fukuoka Prize

Asia is home to diverse ethnic groups, languages, and cultures that coexist and exchange with each other. These diverse cultures have served not only as guardians of their long history and traditions, but also as sources of innovation.

However, with the advance of globalization, we face the risk that Asia may lose its unique cultures due to the encroaching cultural homogenization. It is therefore vital to preserve, nurture and promote the harmonious coexistence of Asian cultures.

Fukuoka has since antiquity played a significant role as Japan's gateway for exchanges with the rest of the Asian region. With its unique history in mind, the Fukuoka Prize was established in 1990 through the collaboration of the City Government, academia and private businesses in order to contribute to peace, and to further understand the extraordinary cultures of the Asian region. Since then,

many laureates with distinguished achievements throughout most of the Asian region have been awarded the Prize.

Cultural exchange that takes the future into consideration is not only to preserve and inherit unique cultures which have long history and traditions. It also looks to something born from the midst of change. It is necessary to respect, learn from and build upon what we discover. Fukuoka City with its citizens aspire to achieve this while striving to become the center for cultural exchange in Asia.

We, the organizers, together with the citizens of Fukuoka, honor the individuals who have made contributions to the fields of Asian studies, Asian art and Asian culture. We are determined to spread the value of Asia's unique and varied cultures to the world from our city's point of view.

The Fukuoka Prize was established to honor the eminent achievements of individuals, groups or organizations who create as well as preserve the many distinct and diverse cultures in the Asian region. The Prize aims to foster and increase awareness of the value of Asian cultures, and to establish a foundation from which people of the Asia can learn and share with one another.

To be presented to an individual or group who has made outstanding contributions to the preservation and creation of Asian culture, and has demonstrated the significance of Asian culture to the world through the internationality, universality, popularity, and/or creativity of their work.

To be presented to an individual or group who has made outstanding achievements in the field of Asian studies, contributing to the world's understanding of Asia.





Prof. Randolf David is a sociologist who has played a dynamic part in achieving social justice in the Philippines, by sharing his knowledge not only with the students through his university lectures but also more widely with the general public through TV programs and newspaper columns. He has also striven for intellectual and cultural exchanges and mutual understanding among Asian countries, through cooperative links with the United Nations University and Japanese university lecturers and intellectuals. His determination and activity to transform currently existing society for the better, by opening universities to the public and by working together with citizens or overseas countries, have won him high praise as a leading Asian public intellectual, a man of action as well as ideas.

Prof. David was born in 1946 in San Fernando, Pampanga Province, which is north of Manila and in the Central Luzon Region of the Philippines. At the age of 15, he was admitted to the University of the Philippines Diliman, studied sociology and graduated with distinction. He promptly got a post of part-time lecturer of sociology, and then the outstanding potential of his talent earned him a Rockefeller scholarship for further study at the Graduate School of the University of Manchester, UK. However, when he was back in the Philippines to collect material for his doctoral thesis, in September 1972, President Marcos proclaimed martial law. Prof. David chose not to go back to the UK to continue his studies there, but decided to throw himself into political and social turbulence of the Philippines and to live through it as a fully involved participant. He went back to his old university as a fulltime lecturer, and ever since, as an educator and researcher, and as an opinion leader in Philippine society, he has been actively engaged in society and has contributed to bringing about democracy, social reform and justice.

In 1977, Prof. David founded the Third World Studies Center at the University of the Philippines, where the harmful effects of authoritative top-down development and the problems of emerging sovereign states are

analyzed, and countermeasures to these, and pathways to social development where the general public take the lead, are explored. In partnership with the United Nations University, the Center invites researchers from ASEAN countries and supports research projects, and also welcomes a wide range of visitors such as overseas students, and Filipino or foreign NGO members and activists. The results of this research are reported in the journal Kasarinlan (in English, Autonomy), which was first published in 1985. The publication of Banana and the Japanese (1982) by Mr. Tsurumi Yoshiyuki, a well-known scholar of Asian Studies, was also made possible by Prof. David's comprehensive support for on-site field research and data collection.

After the 'People Power Revolution' in February 1986 which overthrew the dictatorship and led to democracy, Prof. David's commitment to active social engagement brought him an important role as co-producer and host of a weekly TV debate program called "Public Forum". In this program, for thirteen years he picked out pressing political, economic and social issues, and invited members of the general public to discuss these with the government officials responsible and the parties directly involved, and served as coordinator of the sometimes intensely heated debates in Filipino (the national language); he thus helped shape public opinion. Since 1995, he has had his own column in an influential newspaper, "The Philippine Daily Inquirer", and still continues to express his views there in English. His comments on current affairs have been compiled and published in three volumes, which are used as sociology textbooks for university students, but which also explain problems and show the ways to solve them in a plain language.

For his great and enduring contribution to social development in his own country, to mutual understanding in Asian society and to grassroots-level exchange, Prof. Randolf David is truly worthy for the Grand Prize of the Fukuoka Prize.

Prof. Leonard Blussé has created a new academic field, broad in its chronological and geographical scope, "the maritime history of early modern East/Southeast Asia", establishing an interdisciplinary approach as a foundation for historical studies. His studies began from Sinology, then some elements of Japanese Studies were added, before embracing the maritime history of East Asia with his studies about Overseas Chinese, and have now expanded to include maritime history of Southeast Asia. In the currently popular trend of 'global history' in historical studies, his approach is highly regarded as providing an ideal framework for 'global history' based on empirical 'micro' analysis without ever losing the 'macro' conceptual perspective.

Prof. Blussé was born in Rotterdam, The Netherlands in 1946. In 1965 he entered Leiden University and studied Sinology. After conducting research in various places including The Institute for Research for the Humanities at Kyoto University, Japan (1972-75), since 1975 he has been based at Leiden University as researcher and teacher, and gave lectures on such subjects as 'History of the relationship between Asia and Europe' and 'History of Southeast Asia' until 2011.

Prof. Blusse's research is founded on what might be called the Leiden school of historical studies, which is built on the thorough examination of documentary material. His particular forte as a historian is his ability to make good use of such texts as the vast number of surviving records of the trading activities of The Dutch East India Company (VOC) between the ports of Batavia (modern Jakarta), Canton (modern Guangzhou) and Nagasaki in the 17th - 18th Centuries. The other distinctive feature of his research is his strong interests in the people who lived in that era, and his method of bringing them to life through individual biographical case

studies. The best example is Strange Company (1986), published being based on his doctoral thesis: one of the chapters was translated into Japanese and published in 1988 under the title, Tomboy Cornelia's Battle: the Life of a Dutch-Japanese Lady in 17th century Batavia. This tells the life story of a Dutch-Japanese woman in the VOC's base at Batavia, against the background of a vivid description of the multi-ethnic city and its diverse population, and especially the complications and conflicts between eastern and western cultures.

Prof. Blussé subsequently produced a large number of works which provide a foundation for empirical historical studies, with such publications as the 13 volumes of The Deshima Diaries (1640-1800) (1986-2010). Meanwhile he also worked on books about the maritime history of early modern East/Southeast Asia from a comprehensive global perspective. In Visible Cities (2008), based on his Edwin O. Reischauer Memorial Lecture given at Harvard University, he compares three port cities, each with deep connections to the VOC: Batavia, Canton and Nagasaki. In this book he discusses the effect of the arrival and the expansion of Europe and the US in East/Southeast Asia in the early modern and modern periods, and describes local reactions, and the independent character of local commerce, as reflected in the activities of

At Leiden University, many scholars from Asia, including Japan, have benefited from Prof. Blusse's teaching, and many of them now have successful careers as historians. In this respect, too, he had played an instrumental role as a bridge connecting Asia and Europe.

Thus in light of Prof. Leonard Blusse's remarkable achievements, he is very much worthy of the Academic Prize of the Fukuoka Prize.

The stage director and playwright Mr. Sato Makoto has created a large number of outstanding theatrical productions which combine a contemporary ambience with traditional aesthetic sensibility. His innovative work has been highly praised both in Japan and abroad. He has also taken a leading role in promoting international exchange with Asian theatrical professionals, and enhancing the construction of regional networks. Furthermore, working as the artistic director of public theaters, he has engaged himself in embodying the concept of 'theater as a meeting point for local people, and thus completely transformed the conventional image of public halls. In recent years, he has been energetically involved in educating the younger generation.

Mr. Sato was born in Tokyo in 1943. After he completed his training at the school of drama associated with the Haiyuza Theater Company in 1966, he founded the Underground Free Stage Theater. In 1968, he joined Theater Center 68 (currently, Black Tent Theater), and along with his contemporaries, Mr. Terayama Shuji and Mr. Kara Juro, he became a leading underground theater playwright and stage director, and produced a series of remarkable works. From 1970 he conducted nationwide tours, putting on performances in a large-scale tent. By 1990, the company had travelled to 120 cities in Japan, and such plays as Nezumi Kozo Jirokichi (which won the Kishida Prize for Drama in 1971) and the Showa Era Trilogy (1975-79), both of which he wrote and directed, established his fame as a stage director and playwright. Besides directing his own plays, he is active in a wide range of genres from opera and Japanese dance to puppet shows.

His participation in an international workshop organized by the Philippine Educational Theater Association (PETA) in 1980 deepened his ties with Asia, and he acted as host of the 3rd Asian Theater Forum (1983), and thus began networking with his Asian counterparts. He established a close working cooperation with leading contemporary artistic directors notable for promoting messages about society through theater, such as Mr.

Kuo Pao Kun from Singapore, Mr. Krishen Jit from Malaysia, Mr. Rendra from Indonesia and Mr. Danny Yung from Hong Kong (winner of the Art and Culture Prize of the 25th Fukuoka Prize). He has dedicated himself to introducing Asian contemporary drama to Japan as well as staging joint multi-national productions.

At the same time, with his practical understanding of the frontline of theatrical spaces and production sites, Mr. Sato has been involved for many years in building and running public theaters, as the first Theater Director of the Setagaya Public Theater (1997-2002) and also the first Artistic Director of Za-Koenji (2009-). He has made great efforts in diverse ways to develop outreach initiatives in order to connect the local population to theaters, including setting up drama workshops for them, and has worked hard to embody the concept of 'theaters as meeting points for people. For this pioneering activity in creating a new role for public theaters, too, Mr. Sato has earned a high reputation.

He taught at Tokyo Gakugei University from 1998 to 2009 and devoted himself to training the next generation. At Za-Koenji, too, he established the 'Theater Creation Academy' for training future directors to run public theaters (2009). Moreover, in 2017, using his own resources, he opened a private art center in Yokohama called 'WAKABACHO WHARF'. The activities of this center as a base for young Asian theatrical professionals to meet and work are currently attracting considerable attention.

Mr. Sato Makoto's high achievement has not been confined to his remarkable work as a stage director and playwright, but through drama he has also rendered pioneering services to international exchange in Asia. Furthermore, as artistic director of public theaters, he has successfully transformed the image of public halls. Meanwhile his dedication to projects for fostering young Asian talents in the dramatic world continues. For these contributions, Mr. Sato is truly worthy for the Art and Culture Prize of the Fukuoka Prize.

With this the milestone 30th Fukuoka Prize Award Ceremony was closed feeling joy and inspiration.



An Address by His Imperial Highness Crown Prince Akishino at The Fukuoka Prize 2019 Award Ceremony



On this auspicious occasion of the Fukuoka Prize 2019 Award Ceremony today, I wish to extend my heartfelt congratulations to Professor Randolf David, laureate of the Grand Prize, Professor Leonard Blussé, laureate of the Academic Prize, and Mr. Makoto Sato, laureate of the Arts and Culture Prize on receiving their awards.

Furthermore, it is most gratifying that this Prize is celebrating its milestone 30th Anniversary on this occasion, and I would like to

Hoping that my many years of Asian history research proves useful for the future

Since old times, Kyushu was the most open of the Japanese islands to the world. Although oceans divide the continents, they also connect them. As Confucius said, "within the four seas, all men are brothers."

I have spent most of my life studying the maritime history of Asia and the history of trade between Asia and the West. I think there is no better place for me to receive this distinguished prize than the famous ancient port town of Hakata.

When I was a student, I was fortunate enough to have studied under the best anthropologists and historians in Taiwan, Japan, and China. When I started teaching, I

wanted to give something back to them, so I accepted exchange students from all over Asia. Many of these students went on to become university professors, and they are now invaluable research partners of

I would like to dedicate this prize to all the Asian scholars who have kindly taken care of me then and

In my private and professional life, I have strived to support researchers and young students coming from overseas. I shared with them historical materials, personal knowledge, and my ideas about analytical techniques. This kind of effort is extremely important, and I think it must continue worldwide.

Historical research is based upon the critical analysis of primary resources. Today, the international community is threatened by identity politics, nationalism, and religious ideologies that favor the collective interest of certain groups. However, it is my hope that the study of history will continue to serve as a healthy antidote to these sentiments.

I want to share this joy with my friends in the ephemeral world of theater

Your Imperial Highnesses Crown Prince and Crown Princess Akishino, Mayor Takashima, distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen, and the citizens of Fukuoka, I would like to thank you from the bottom of my heart for inviting me here as one of the recipients of the Fukuoka Prize on its 30th anniversary.

Fukuoka brings back memories for me. For 20 years in the 1970s and 1980s, I came here many times to perform with the Black Tent Theater on their nationwide tours. I fondly remember putting up our tent in Maizuru Park and Nishi Park and staying up all night talking to the many people we met. Theatrical expression is both pure and ephemeral. It only exists in a certain place for a certain time, and when it's

over it leaves no trace. So, for me and my colleagues in the theater world, memories are particularly invaluable. With the advancement of information technology, we now live in a world where it is possible to easily and cleanly record images and sounds and share them with people all over the world instantaneously. However, this kind of information cannot capture and bring to life the spirit of human experience and emotion like a memory that we have memorized with our body and our senses and that we can occasionally recount to others. As a person of the theater whose work has relied solely on trusting the people in the room, I made many memories in the 20 years I spent traveling with tent theaters to 120 cities inside and outside Japan and the 40 years I spent developing friendships with theater people throughout Asia, but today I have created a new one. I would like to share this happiness and gratitude with all of these friends.

I have the utmost respect for Fukuoka, a city that turned its sights to Asia before anywhere else in Japan to become a bridge into a new era, and that, for 30 years, has been discovering, passing on, and creating value and forging bonds among the people of Asia.

Q: What is your impression of Fukuoka? Prof. David / A: I first visited the city 32 years ago, and a lot of what I remember still remains. The bathrooms are clean, the sidewalks are wide, and the parks are big. Today, I feel as if I have been knighted by Japan. I think I will bring this medal with me every time I visit Japan. Q: What about sociology fascinates

Prof. David / A: I enjoy sociology because it lets you observe society just like you would observe a living thing. Many kinds of people live in society, and the more complex a society becomes, the more carefully you have to examine its internal structures. I think sociology is a field that gives you insight into the complexity of humans, and it can help find solutions to any problems that arise. Q: What is important for promoting intellectual and culture exchange and mutual understanding in Asia?

Prof. David / A: I think the efforts that the city of Fukuoka is undertaking are important. In other words, it is important to bring people from different countries together and accept cultural diversity. If people can understand other cultures from the viewpoint of their own culture, I think wars can be avoided.

Q: Have you always wanted to be a researcher?

Prof. Blussé / A: Not necessarily. When I was a child, I wanted to be a sailor or a ship captain.

Q: Have you always been interested in the ocean?

Prof. Blussé / A: Of course. I was not interested in history, but 50 years ago, I felt that the future of the world was going to be Asian. Unfortunately, the Cultural Revolution broke out in China when I started my studies, so I could not go to China. But I did visit Japan on a recommendation from a professor from Taiwan.

Q: What has been the happiest moment of your life as a researcher?

Prof. Blussé / A: The happiest time was when I was a student, especially when I visited Japan. I had some interesting experiences here. I met temple masters in small villages, and I had a part-time job as a movie extra. I was even in one of Ken Takakura's movies. I always played the part of the evil American soldier.

Q: What advice do you have for the younger generation?

Prof. Blussé / A: My only advice is this: Show an interest in the people around

Q: What made you decide to become a playwright and stage director?

Mr. Sato / A: I've heard this question countless times over the last 60 years, but honestly, I can't remember. If I had to wager a guess, I'd say it was because, when I was a child, my siblings and friends said I was no fun to play with. When we played house, if I


didn't come in from what we decided was the entrance, they would get mad at me and tell me I was doing it wrong and was annoying. I think this is where

Q: You composed and directed the piece that Yuki Magosaburo XII will perform later. What is your relationship

Mr. Sato / A: Youkiza is a theater company with 300 years of history, and in my twenties, his father Magosaburo X took me under his wing. He was unique in that he actively adopted new things despite being the head of a traditional theater company. I directed Macbeth as well as many new pieces with him. I am the same age as Magosaburo XII, so we are good friends. We both try to shake things up in our plays.

- History, Culture, and Politics
- The Unique Experiences Generated by People Power



Professor David is a Filipino sociologist who has also worked as a TV host and a producer. In this public lecture, he talked about Philippine politics, culture, and history as well as the important events that led to the formation of Philippine society.

The talk began with professor David posing a question: "Do you know what is happening in the Philippines right now?" He said that the answer is not simple and began explaining the experiences unique to the Philippines.

First, regarding culture and history, he explained that the

ethnic communities in the Philippines are not unified and described how these regional differences could not be overcome during the Spanish rule. After this, he discussed how landowners exercising minority rule still existed when democracy began to take root under American rule. Discussing the various factors that contributed to this context, he explained that "Filipinos were angry at the elites who controlled the country for a long time, so they wanted a leader to emerge from the people who could take the power back."

Next, he touched on the two types of politicians that have succeeded in the Philippines. The first type is the authoritarian leaders like President Marcos and President Duterte, while the other type is the moral leaders like President Aquino, but the Filipino people have always been drawn to the former. After this, he provided commentary on recent administrations namely, how Marcos strived to concentrate all kinds of power, how Aquino's moral character gave her credibility, and how the charismatic Duterte earned the support of people angry at society and past leaders.

He talked passionately about the People Power Revolution and how the assassination of Benigno Aquino, an opponent of the ruling government, led to the people rallying behind his widow Corazon Aquino to oust Ferdinand Marcos from power. According to David, the concept of People Power is now a global framework for peacefully overthrowing authoritarian regimes, and it still remains as a part of the political consciousness of the Filipino people. He ended his lecture, by stating, "Our search for social development with people in the leading role will not end until we can find the right formula for bridging the gap between law and culture and between the modern Constitution and national loyalty. And this will likely remain an issue for the current generation and the next."

Professor David discussed Philippine society by effectively weaving in the experience of him and his late wife Karina who worked with him. His speaking style, which was reminiscent of a news caster, fascinated the

In part two, professor David and professor Fujiwara discussed the impact that the progressive measures taken at the time had on the people and industry, including university professors appearing on current affairs programs, and people speaking in Tagalog instead of the customary English. Next, in an up-tempo dialogue with the interlocutor, he talked about a range of topics including how the People Power Revolution was unable to create an alternative form of government, the global spread of populism today, and how social media is drastically reshaping the political

The audience asked questions about the best way to enjoy the Philippines and the country's educational system, and professor David replied, throwing in the occasional joke. The session served to provide the audience with more knowledge about politics in the Philippines and the world, and most certainly aroused their interest in the topic.


Three Bold Entrepreneurs and Their Heritage

As people who live in the age of globalization, what should we learn from history? This is the question the audience was made to ponder in Leonard BLUSSÉ's lecture about three merchants from 400 years ago who contributed to globalization through their experiences in the Far East in an age of political

He explained: "When you look at the process of globalization, it appears as a tapestry that has been woven by outstanding people over several centuries. In the beginning,

it was a loose patchwork. Different patterns emerged in different regions, and the people involved were barely able to connect them. But gradually, a uniformed pattern emerged to form a single tapestry. The history of connection became the history of globalization. The globalization that is frequently mentioned now started about 400 years ago with the global trade in tea, sugar, and silk. The trailblazers of this globalization were Suminokura Ryoi (and his son), François Caron, and Koxinga (and his son). Japan and China resisted Western interference for generations. But the Dutch East India Company (VOC) sailed to the East to set up outposts in Japan and China. Amid this backdrop, these three entrepreneurs expanded their networks in their own ways, and they left their names in the history books as troubleshooters living in the same tumultuous era. They did not get their start on accident, however. It was the result of possessing outstanding abilities along with intelligence, will, and personality. In an age of tumult, these three can be considered the first weavers of the tapestry of globalization I mentioned earlier. Today, this tapestry continues to be woven, and it continues to change. These three men experienced many things and made many things happen. But they would not have been able to succeed without vision and diligence. I believe there are many things we can learn from their resolve and courage." The audience listened intently to Blusse's fascinating lecture on history, which he concluded by asking them to see the statue of Suminokura Ryoi when they visit Arashiyama in Kyoto.

Understanding the Globalization that flourished transnationally in the 17th century with its history

In a lively interview following the lecture, the participants engaged in a dialogue about the three merchant adventurers who not only adeptly followed the paths that were presented to them in life, but also forged their own paths. Associate Professor Matsukata began the exchange with a question: "To leave your mark on history, you cannot just be admirable. Leaving a legacy requires the help of those who come after you. In this sense, how important were the Dutch resources in your work?" Blussé replied by saying, "It was interesting to see how the work of the Asians was viewed by the Europeans. History is human. We know that these three entrepreneurs from the 17th century could speak Japanese, so that's why I wanted to give a lecture on them." This information session highlighted what makes history interesting by showing how the history of the 17th century lives on to this day, and how each of these three men, each with their own senses of loyalty; helped to shape the economy.

Reflecting on Mr. Sato's history of working throughout Asia within historical context, a passionate discussion was held on the situation facing the Asian theater today compared to its past.

According to Mr. Sato, a few decades ago, Asian theater was already doing what is expected by the Japanese theater industry today, and already had an organized system. In his assessment, the term "Asian theater" embodied an attempt to relativize itself to reflect

modern theater, however no one openly proclaims that they are practicing "Asian theater nowadays. He showed video to explain how artists throughout Asia have become even more active in different ways by collaborating, visiting and inviting each other to workshops. When he was asked why he began working in Asia, he replied by saying, "I was forced to think about Asia because Japan is without question, located at the eastern edge of Asia. I was also interested in Asia in terms of Japanese involvement in the region and the fact that 'Asia' is a term that was not coined by Asian people but decided by someone else to mean 'non-European." Next, Mr. Sato showed a video of his Wakabacho Wharf project and used gestures to explain that theater has the mysterious power to foster communication without words. Finally, Mr. Sato touched on the change of three fundamental values of sharing, networking, and crossing borders. The first session ended with Mr. Sato's thanking his colleagues, and he mentioned that he wanted to develop a better understanding of the changes occurring in the world today.

Topic: The Dreams of Theater I want to show the joy of watching 'people'

The audience was enthralled by the fascinating interview with Ms. Watanabe, who has been writing plays for 40 years. Mr. Sato said that the world of theater is often thought to be glamorous, but in fact, it is something much more realistic and close to people. He told the audience he wanted them to watch at least two plays a year, and Ms. Watanabe quipped, "I could watch plays every day", which drew laughs from the audience. She continued by saying that one good point about plays is that they cast a spotlight on minorities. She also mentioned that there is no other country that shows various plays as much as Japan does. She said the same play can be performed in many different ways because of the tolerance for diversity in the Japanese theater industry.

However, she also talked about how she accepted the role of president for the Japan Playwrights Association, because she questioned the male dominated industry, and she showcased the vast number of women who are active in theater. Then the conversation switched to behind-the scenes topics, like how performers give everything right up to the last moment. Next, the two turned to the main topic of *The Dreams of Theater*, Mr. Sato said that he chose the topic based on Ms. Watanabe's motto, "the power to dream. Their enthusiastic discussion came to a close with them both in agreement that they want to believe in the power to dream because theater has the ability to unify different ideas into one theme.



Randolf DAVID

The visit began with the entire school greeting Prof. Randolf David in Tagalog. After a performance by the Japanese drum club, Prof. David had an on-stage discussion with five student representatives on what is necessary to survive in the global society of tomorrow. The students asked questions including on Japan-Philippines relations and on the dreams that Filipino children have. Some of these questions were posed in English. Prof.David spoke about the importance of building new relations based on an understanding of the histories of each other's countries and their past experiences, understanding the situation that children in your own country currently face, as well as learning the cultures of other countries.

Next, Prof. David asked the students if they felt pressure to study. The students said they could overcome the pressure by participating in extracurricular activities and encouraging each other. His visit ended with Prof. David telling the students that he would like them to visit other countries and experience a wide array of cultures. The entire student body expressed their gratitude by singing two Japanese songs, [Yume no Sekai wo] and [Furusato], and presenting Prof. David with a bouquet of flowers.

Prof. Leonard Blussé was greeted with a rousing performance by the school's brass band. After listening to the students' presentation on Netherlands-Japan relations that they prepared as part of their self-directed studies, he gave a speech entitled "When in Rome, do as the Romans do," which included an explanation of the history of modern East Asia. Using paintings from the Edo era, he talked about the lives of Dutch merchants who were the only foreigners allowed to trade with Japan and China back then and why it was important for them to behave like the locals.

In the question-and-answer session after the lecture, Prof. Blussé replied in Japanese. When he was asked which language was the hardest to learn, he said "Nothing is difficult if learning a language when you are young, but Spanish felt difficult because I started learning it when I was 65. This is why you should learn languages while you are young. If possible, you should not only study English, but learn a language of a neighboring Asian country and study their customs." The humorous discussion about his experiences working as a film extra was well received. At the end of the visit, the students presented Prof. Blussé with a bouquet of flowers and a handmade souvenir and said good bye in Dutch. It was a truly lively lecture.







Arts and Culture Prize

SATO Makoto

Japan | Playwright & Theater Director

Based on the topic of meeting people, Mr. Sato sprinkled in some humor as he talked about his personal experiences, including things schools don't teach students and backstage anecdotes. The principal opened the visit by telling the students, "Please be graceful for this invaluable opportunity" and they listened intently to the lecture about the unknown world of theater. Some of the students eagerly took notes as they tried to absorb knowledge from Mr. Sato, who mentioned that high school was a very important time in his life appeared to connect directly with their own concerns and thoughts. Mr. Sato recounted that the books, towns, and people that he encountered when he was in high school helped make him who he is today.

In the question-and-answer session, a student asked for advice on becoming self-sufficient even aboard. Sato said, "There are no major barriers between yourself and the outside world, so you should go see it with your own eyes." He finished the visit with some words of encouragement, "Cherish those times when you feel that something is weird or strange. Do not disregard those feelings. Don't believe in tomorrow; believe in the day after tomorrow."



This symposium of past laureates was held to commemorate the 30th anniversary of the Fukuoka Prize. With Their Imperial Highnesses Crown Prince and Crown Princess Akishino in attendance, local citizens packed into the venue to hear the wise words of past laureates. The crowd applauded loudly as the past laureates walked onto the stage, and Developing Asia and the Coexistence of Cultures, the 30th Anniversary Commemorative Symposium of Past Laureates began.



Developing Asia: 1990-2019

The symposium began with Prof. Suehiro Akira (Japan) giving an economist's point of view on the main theme of "Developing Asia". He talked about how Asia, and East Asia in particular, achieved the world's

highest level of economic growth for more than 50 years earlier than any other region in the world, how the region successfully reduced poverty, and how this came to be called the "East Asian Miracle." However, the economic disparity has expanded since the 1990s, and he raised the issue of how we can create a new Asian society with China playing a central role.



Changes brought by social developments

The issue is inequality

According to Thai economist Prof. Pasuk Phongpaichit, the biggest issue we face as society continues to advance is inequality. She says that Thailand ranks first or second in the world for wealth inequality, and she raised the alarm over how the disparity between the rich and the poor has grown as society has become richer.

Advancing culture

Vietnamese fashion designer Ms. Minh Hanh said that social development has caused new issues, such as climate change, natural disasters, and the threat of terrorism. She also stated that cultural advancement needs to catch up with economic development and that their balance should be maintained for the world to continue developing sustainably. She ended her remarks by declaring that the world consists of a diverse array of cultures.



"Forest spirits" and "gods of wind"

Filipino filmmaker and culture observer Mr. Kidlat Tahimik talked about the Ifugao tribe, who lives deep in the mountains in northern Luzon in the Philippines. He said they used to pay respect to the forest spirits and the

gods of wind and had been living in harmony with nature for 3,000 years. However after the colonists arrived, the Ifugao's children started using chainsaws to cut down the forests. He appealed to the audience by saying that humans need to stop and revisit the cultures that have existed since old times.



The role of culture in realizing sustainable societies in Asia

The next topic was the role of culture in achieving sustainable societies in Asia. The panelists engaged in a lively exchange of opinions on the importance of protecting and inheriting culture and the roles that culture can play in achieving sustainable societies in Asia.

Culture that transcends national boundaries

British Dr. Chris Baker, explained that "culture" means "beautiful things." He said that beautiful music, art, and fashion can easily transcend borders, and that the same applies to the beautiful landscapes of the terraced rice paddies where the Ifugao tribe lives. He pointed out, however, that no matter how beautiful, language does not transcend borders as easily. Based on his experience of translating ancient Thai poetry, he said that humans have always been curious about other cultures and that translation helps to bring humans with different cultures closer together by removing language barriers.

Next, Prof. Pasuk Phongpaichit, Dr. Baker's translation partner, explained that human curiosity in communicating with different cultures

has led to the current global boom in literary translation. She said you can understand how people who live in a certain country or culture think by reading their literature.



Culture is a driving force

Meanwhile, Ms. Minh Hanh explained that culture impacts economics on a deep level and that culture is the essential driving force behind continued social progress. She mentioned that we humans are the biggest benefactors of cultural advancement.

The role that the Fukuoka Prize has played

During the short 90 minutes of the symposium, the audience witnessed the wisdom of the past laureates. The evening ended with comments on the role that the Fukuoka Prize has played. First, Prof. Suehiro said the Fukuoka Prize is a new form of exchange. Next, Dr. Baker said that the Fukuoka Prize is like a lighthouse that shows us which way to proceed, and he expressed his gratitude and appreciation to the people of Fukuoka City for having their foresight to create this unique prize.

After the comments from the laureates, moderator Ms. Doden Aiko closed the 30th Anniversary Commemorative Symposium of Past Laureates by saying, "The story of the Fukuoka Prize will continue to live on every time you, the members of the audience, are expose to the culture of Asia."




